# MY VIEWS.....MANIPAL ALUMNI

For the past 45 years, I have been very involved in several organizations starting from boys' scouts during school days, organizing parties during college days and was also very involved in the dental association in my professional years. This has definitely given me the insight into management of an organization and in resolving issues.

Three and a half years ago as I was stepping out of the Presidency of the Asia Pacific Dental Federation, my colleague, Dr Jeyalan was pondering whether it is timely to develop the Manipal Alumni to a higher standing among all the alumni in this country. After various discussions with closed friends, together we decided to embark on this project. As birds of the same feather flocked together, we had a plan and assembled a team who were very much interested in taking this alumni from its doldrums to one to be reckoned with. The following AGM, we took office with five senior members who had invaluable experience and young vibrant members in the hope of developing a succession plan for the alumni. I was then elected as the Honorary Treasurer of the Manipal Alumni.

When I was handed over the relevant financial documents and attendance list accrued over 19 years in a cardboard box, I knew I was in for a nightmare. The new committee sprang

into action as soon as they took office and charted the plan of action for the year. We focused on CPD activities, new concepts of sponsorship, computerization of membership records and accounting. We successfully executed our plans and by the end of the first year, we manage to put in place the computerized database of membership records, increased the fixed deposit of the alumni to RM 150,000, reviewed the constitutions and managed to bring new members to join the alumni. This is followed by the setting up of a new Secretariat in Bangsar with a salaried employee.

Treasurers are rare breed of people who volunteer into taking the responsibility of managing funds and presenting the accounts at Annual General Meetings and to answer all queries from members. As past treasurer of many other organizations before and now the Manipal Alumni, I was very enthusiastic in carrying out my responsibilities for the alumni. The success of this position is a very simple formula, we have to spend and manage funds

accordingly to the needs of the alumni and continuously raising sufficient funds through sponsorships. A reasonable contingency fund of RM 150,000 should remain in the fixed deposit. This is the basic principle that a treasurer should follow at any point of time.

All financial records inclusive of cash books, receipt books, cheque books and bank & credit card statements are properly filed and safely kept at the secretariat. At the end of the year these documents are presented to certified public accountants who were elected during Annual General Meetings. Ultimately these accountants will produce the accounts of the year to be presented to all members of the committee. The treasurer with the internal auditors and the committee members will review the accounts before being tabled to members at the AGM.

After years of voluntary work for the alumni, it saddens me to hear some members from the floor questioning






the creditability of the accounts presented and claiming that it was a waste of money to pay certified public accountants to audit the accounts for the alumni. It is disheartening to note that these members did not bother to take in account that when I was furnished the accounts there was no opening balance and no proper financial documents at all. I wonder whether these members who speak poorly about the preparations of the accounts have any credentials on accounting procedures. A growing Association like ours does not need pessimists to fractionalize and destroy the harmony that exists within this organization.

It was an enjoyable time for me working with a great committee and I am very sure other members feel the same way too. As the saying goes, all good things must come to an end and I will complete my term of office gracefully and hope to spend my time seeing my patients in the morning and playing golf in the evening.



Upon arriving at the Siem Reap-Angkor International Airport, we were all very tempted to say Sawadikaap to the airport staff as we felt like we were in Thai-

Siem Reap City is the capital of Siem Reap Province, Cambodia. Siam Reap means the defeat of Siam(Thailand) as this place was once ruled by Thailand. The Cambodians are very loyal to their King and a majority of them are Buddhist followed by Hindus....which explains the many Hi ndu sites and influences around and some Christians.

After clearing immigration, we were welcomed by our local our guide ....Mr.Vooti, who is a qualified teacher but now a full time tour guide and he was very knowledgeable and had a good command of the English language....the only problem was at times not being able to follow his accent after having a couple of shots...! After having a quick English breakfast we headed to Tonle Sap Lake...which is South East Asia's largest freshwater lake and boy oh boy it was large! I showered and had a well deserved sleep of course due to the humid weather outside and fatigue(shame to all those who had a wild imagination and thought I did something else).

After a good rest, we headed out for dinner to a place near by and we were treated to a local Cultural show. It reminded me of the Balinese dance and it was nothing much to shout about....probably because we itching to start partying in Siam Reap and party time it was at Pub Street after hurrying dinner. Yes, Pub Street was the place to be...nice music, nice places, nice settings nice babes and of course cheap, cheap beers...50cents to US 1 Dollar for a beer...!Cheers...!!!For those of us who wanted something more than a beer, there was ... Happy Pizza...!I will leave it to Selva, Arasu, Nirmal and Meera to let you know about Happy Pizza in the next issue. The next day, (Day 2) we went for a tour of the 'Killing Fields'...it was the mini 'Killing Fields' and not the main Killing Fields at Phnom Penh. It was quite eerie to see hundreds of skulls and even more sickening to know how they were killed...Really dread about going to Phnom Penh now .The 'Killing Fields was then followed by a visit to the Le Artisans D'Angkor which was most definitely in Siam Reap and not a place some where in France as the name would have suggested. This is where many of the crafts of Cambodia are made and sold at exorbitant prices in US Dollars...probably the same thing is happening here in Selangor Pewters.

After lunch and a short snooze, it was time for us to make our way up to Bakheng Hill to view sunset. All the huffing and puffing(at least most of us were) going up the hill was in vain as the weather conditions did not permit us to have a good view of the sunset but we managed to get some scenic views and some amazing photo shots(depending on Nirmal for some photos from his 'canggih' zoom camera). It gets dark rather early here by 6.30pm. Soon it was dinner time and back to the room early to prepare for the hectic and big day ahead for wat....i mean Angkor Wat!

Day 3 arrived and it was an early start. We were on the bus by 6.30am departing for Kbal Spean, a journey that will take 1.5-2hrs. It was very pleasant to see the countryside along the way, nature preserved the way it should be. The next part of the journey was of to the Bayon Temple which is not only famous for its temples but also because one Mrs. Brad Pitt (not Jennifer Aniston but Angelina Jolie) shot a scene from 'Tomb Raider' there and henceforth picked up and adopted Maddox(hope got the name right). Along the way, we got to see a few more places of interest, namely South Gate of Angkor Thom, Elephant Terrace, Leper King Terrace and Royal Enclosure.

Dr. Thomas Koshy gave an inspiring speech to motivate and persuade the new aluminus to join the fold. Below is the excerpt of the speech.

Salutations and Congratulations to the new graduates. Since the first Malaysian graduate from Manipal in the early 60's the numbers to leave the shores of India have been gradually increasing. Today more than 5,000 Malaysians have graduated from Manipal or Mangalore, which together encompass Manipal University. More than three quarter of the graduates are medical doctors, another 20% comprising dental surgeons and the rest Pharmacist and Engineers

The Malaysian Government confidentially made a foray into medical twinning programme 15 years ago knowing very well that Manipal University had set a precedence for the caliber of doctors the University has produced.

I am happy to note Manipalites have and continue to make a great impact in this country in all the vocations. In the public and private sector Manipalites have made great strides and have cultivated a name for themselves.

Today, I stand in front of you as the President of the most active and largest Alumni in this country. I stand firm and remain convicted with my statement. Our membership continues to grow and by the end of this year, it would have reached its 1,000 mark.

The Manipal Alumni Association Malaysia was incepted in August, 1986, after a small group of medical doctors, dental surgeons and pharmacist got together a year before that to set the groundwork. It was duly registered with the ROS on that date with a formally placed constitution.

Activities are the hallmark of any association; knowing very well inactivity leads to disinterest and winning numbers. I will briefly allude to you our various activities.

(i) Communication is an important aspect to breath life into the association. We have a quarterly Newsletter – Howzit – an entertaining tabloid meant to take the stress out of our daily activities. Contributions are exclusively by members and their families and the newsletter covers our activities and articles of common interest. On that note I once again want to thank Manipal University for part sponsoring this Newsletter.

Our website continues to update the latest and happy to note that it has been receiving rave comments from our global network of Manipal Alumnus. To be kept relevant we are in facebook.

- (ii) The pride of the Association's activities is our Community Project, dedicated to the marginalized and destitute. This medical and dental camp with close to 30 odd Specialist and General Practitioners in attendance has slowly gained popularity among the Public and the country's leading Newspapers, Star and NST carry full page articles every year highlighting the work done in these camps.
- (iii) Continuing Professional Development.

Using the resources of the many medical and dental specialist from Manipal in the country, we conduct these CPD programmes in 3 major towns in the country every year. This is a runaway success which fosters learning updates and fellowship. Next month on August 15th our next CPD will be held at the Royal Ipoh Club.

(iv) December never fails to disappoint Manipalites. Always taking into account the best facilities, entertainment and great sporting activities the committee spends close to 4 months putting this 3 days 2 nights event into top gear. The record turnout of over 500 manipalites and families speaks volumes of the camaraderie and bonding that is only typical of a Manipalite.

After extolling to you all these activities in a nutshell, I am sure your thoughts may wonder to ask, what's in it for me? The common negative notions that it being monopolized by seniors, difficulty in communicating and a distant feeling comes to mind. That's a natural human tendency and frankly the ice will only break if you take the first step. A steady stream of graduates from Melaka Manipal have joined the Alumni and two of them actively serve in our sub committees.

Now having graduated there are some of you who have set your sites into post graduate programmes and the others either into mainstream public service or private practice as General Practitioner.

Our mentoring programme has seen some level of success where we get the specialist within the fold to assist you in the post graduate programmes that you have determined. Likewise networking in private practice among Manipalites has gained popularity.

I fervently hope with this information in mind, you would confidentally join us and who knows one day one of you present today would be up here speaking the same language to the new graduates from this great school of ours.
